Merlin goes to Cape Town

My wife and I recently visited Cape Town, South Africa. Before going I added the South Africa bird pack to the Merlin Bird Id app. Not long after arriving at our hotel I stepped outside and almost instantly the first bird popped up, a House Sparrow (I kid you not). Despite there being a few other bird calling, nothing else popped up so I went back inside.

Later that day we were at the Kirstenbosch Botanical garden and I fired up Merlin Bird Id standing 30 feet away from a bird calling loudly from the top a bush. I was surprised that Merlin not pop up an identification. There was however a note I had ignored earlier in the day which stated that birds in my current location may not be identified. Clicking on the note there was an explanation that only twenty percent of the potential birds were in the bird pack and that the Cornell Lab needed quality audio files of the remaining eighty percent to add them to the bird pack.

So as it turned out Merlin Bird ID was a complete bust in Cape Town and I did not use it at all after that. Amazing how spoiled we are by the way it works so well in the United States. I'd be curious as to what experiences members have had in other areas of the world.
