It is the time of year where you may see birds that puzzle you. On a recent waterfall hike I came across two fairly tame, pint-sized doves. Size-wise they reminded me of Inca Doves of the southwest US. As it turns out they were juvenile Mourning Doves:



I had another interesting "youngster", this time in my back yard. A young Brown Thrasher accompanied by its parents who were close by. Note the blue eyes which will turn bright yellow when he/she is an adult. On the next page is a picture of one of the parents for comparison.

William writes: As you know, we had an injured bluebird in our yard. We put it in a cardboard box and fed and watered it until we could find out what to do with it. Little Ponderosa Zoo and Rescue will take in birds for rehabbing. They are located at 629 Granite Road in Clinton Tennessee. Their phone number is 865-457-5536. They have a very friendly staff. You can call them for updates on the animal you left with them. They received a turtle and a skunk while we were there. Once you get off the interstate, it is a very beautiful drive.

Joe writes: Thank you for taking care of our feathered friend! I highly recommend that everyone load the "Animal Help Now" app on their phone. It was instrumental in finding rehab for the bluebird. According to the app, the other "not very local" place that may take in an injured songbird is Camp Wildernest Wildlife Center in Chatanooga. Note that a Google search intimates that Chattanooga Zoo has a wildlife rehab department which takes songbirds.
