## **Barb Gilley - Member Contribution**

Barb says, "I was inspired by our "owl lady" who brought her owls to our meeting a few months ago, to install a screech owl box in our backyard. Can't wait til spring to see if I have any prospective tenants.".

Joe Says, you may not have to wait until spring. I put of a Screech Owl box up at the start of last winter and had an owl visit within a couple of weeks. At varying times since then the owl has spent random days sleeping in the box. In fact it has been in the box all but two of the last fourteen days. I did not have a nesting pair this spring, just the one owl using it as a bachelor pad. I highly suggest putting a Blink camera in the box. I have had several middle of the night visits from a flying squirrel and would not have known this if not for the camera capturing video of the visits.
